- 3. "The renowned Journal of Educational Hydration Studies" fake journal name mimics real scholarly sources.
- 4. "A distinguished panel of hydration experts" vague phrase implying credibility with no proof.
- 5. "Structured hydration schedules" formal jargon that sounds policy-based but lacks logic.
