Personal Reflections on the Tao

Instructions: C.S. Lewis's *The Abolition of Man* challenges readers to think about truth, morality, and the future of humanity. Use this journal to reflect on how his arguments connect to your own beliefs and choices. Write honestly and thoughtfully; there are no "right" or "wrong" answers, but your reflections should show depth.

1. Lewis says modern education risks producing "men without chests." How do you understand this metaphor, and do you think it relates to the way you and your peers are educated today?
2. Do you believe in universal moral truths (like honesty or justice) that apply to everyone, or do you think morality depends on culture and personal choice? Why?
3. Lewis defends the Tao (a universal moral law). Write about a personal experience or belief where you felt guided by a principle that seems bigger than individual opinion.
4. Technology and science are powerful today. Lewis warns that without moral grounding, they could lead to domination or even the "abolition of man." Do you see any examples of this concern in modern life?
5. Looking at your own life, what choices or values do you want to protect, even if society treats them as "relative"?
