## Part II - Sample Reflections

- 1. The most striking difference is that genuine communication respects the listener while manipulative speech uses the listener. This shows the ethical stakes behind how words are used.
- 2. Pieper argues that manipulation erodes truth, and without truth, freedom cannot survive; citizens become easier to control.
- 3. Example: A public service announcement encouraging seatbelts (genuine) vs. a flashy ad that exaggerates product benefits (manipulative). The key is whether truth or persuasion is the focus.
- 4. Listeners can question claims, look for evidence, and be alert to emotional tricks that bypass reason.
