Part I - Character Sketch

• The Speaker

- o *Traits*: Should be truthful, responsible, oriented toward reality, not persuasion alone.
- o *Responsibilities*: To present reality faithfully, seek truth, and respect the dignity of the listener.
- Risks if Abused: Uses language as propaganda, manipulates emotions, hides truth for personal gain.

The Listener

- o *Traits*: Must be attentive, critical, discerning, and willing to engage in dialogue.
- Responsibilities: To test the speaker's words against truth, refuse passive acceptance, and seek understanding.
- Risks if Abused: Becomes complacent, gullible, or complicit in spreading falsehoods.

Part II - Reflection Prompts (Sample Answers)

- 1. *The Ethical Speaker*. A speaker must value truth more than persuasion. They should avoid exaggeration or distortion and resist the temptation to use words as tools of power.
- 2. *The Vulnerable Listener*: Pieper argues the listener cannot be passive because manipulation succeeds only when people fail to question what they hear. Active listening guards against deception.
- 3. *Mutual Responsibility*: The speaker and listener are bound together; truth can only be communicated if the speaker intends to share it and the listener seeks to receive it honestly.
- 4. *Modern Application*: In advertising, slogans often promise happiness through buying a product. When listeners believe these without question, they spend money on illusions rather than reality. This shows how abuse of language leads to misplaced trust and distorted values.
