Sample Response:

Position A: Acronyms Help Communication

Acronyms make our world faster and more connected. In technology, saying **AI** instead of *artificial intelligence* saves time and is universally recognized. Teacher's Guide

- Begin with a quick discussion: "What acronyms do you use every day?" Write them on the board and discuss which are formal vs. informal.
- Have students read the passage aloud and underline both benefits and drawbacks of acronym use.
- Split the class into two groups: **Pro-Acronym** and **Anti-Acronym** for a structured mini-debate.

Differentiation Ideas:

- **Grades 7–9:** Allow shorter one-paragraph written arguments instead of oral presentations.
- **Grades 10–12:** Require citations or real-world examples (e.g., news, science, or business acronyms).

Engagement and Extension:

- Have students write a reflective paragraph afterward explaining if their opinion changed after hearing both sides.
- Connect to **media literacy** by examining acronyms used in news headlines or online trends (e.g., "AI," "FOMO," "NFT").
