Teacher's Guide

Skill Focus: Helps students recognize how adapting behavior in social settings like cafeterias involves self-control, empathy, and moral decision-making under peer pressure.

Differentiation Tips:

- Read the story aloud and pause to identify emotional cues (embarrassment, courage).
- Use guided discussion before writing to support comprehension.
- Offer sentence starters or visual prompts (e.g., pictures of cafeteria behavior) for learners needing extra support.

Engagement Ideas:

- Have students role-play both the unkind and kind reactions to highlight how choices change the mood of a scene.
- Ask students to brainstorm ways to make the cafeteria a welcoming space for everyone.

Extension Ideas:

- Invite students to write a short journal entry titled "A Time I Did the Right Thing."
