- Carrying Anchises: Free Will though fate destined Rome's founding,
 Aeneas personally chose to risk his life for his father.
- 2. **Falling in love with Dido**: Fate Venus and Cupid influenced Dido's love, and Aeneas was caught in the gods' plan.
- 3. **Leaving Carthage**: Fate Mercury reminded him of his destiny, and Aeneas obeyed, though torn by emotion.
- 4. **Journey to the Underworld**: Free Will Aeneas actively chose to go, seeking Anchises's wisdom and preparing himself for Rome's future.
- 5. **Killing Turnus**: Free Will Though fate demanded victory, the killing was personal; seeing Pallas's belt triggered a human choice for vengeance.
