DIARY ENTRY #1 - Elizabeth Turner, Loyalist, April 1775

What is to become of our trade, our cities, our families, if we cut ourselves off from the Crown? I believe in loyalty—not just because it is safe, but because it is right. We are British subjects. I worry this rebellion is not liberty-it is chaos."

DIARY ENTRY #2 - Samuel Reed, Patriot, April 1775

"Today, I heard the words of Mr. Henry ring in my ears again-'Give me liberty, or give me death!' I cannot sit idle while Britain taxes us, controls us, and treats us like children. This land is our home-we build it, farm it, live it. Why should we not rule it? If it takes blood to earn our freedom, so be it. I will not bow to a king across the sea."
