

## Two Versions Write-Up Answer Key

### Example Responses (summarized for teachers):

**Conversational Version (with "in back of"):** After class, everyone hangs out in back of the field to relax. Some students toss a football around while others talk about their day. There's a big tree in back of the benches where people like to sit in the shade. Sometimes the coach stores sports gear in back of the small shed too. It's just a nice place to chill before going home.

**Academic Version (with "behind"):** After class, students often gather behind the sports field to unwind. Some play casual games, while others rest quietly near the benches. A large tree grows behind the benches, offering shade to anyone sitting there. The coach also stores equipment behind a small shed for easy access. This area provides a calm space for students to relax before leaving school.

**Analysis Example:** The academic version fits better in a school essay because **behind** sounds formal and the sentence structure is more polished. The conversational version works well for casual storytelling or personal reflection.

### Teacher's Guide

- **Skill Focus:** Understanding how **prepositional choice** and **tone** affect writing style and audience formality.
- **Differentiation Tips:**
  - Encourage struggling learners to brainstorm word swaps that make writing sound more formal (e.g., "chill" → "relax").
  - Have advanced students identify three other informal words to change in their formal rewrite.
- **Engagement Ideas:**
  - Students can read both versions aloud in pairs, then vote on which sounds more essay-ready.
  - Host a mini "tone challenge" where classmates guess whether a paragraph is formal or casual.
- **Extension Activity:**
  - Have students apply the same technique to another prepositional pair (like "near" vs. "close to") in a different writing topic to reinforce tone awareness.
