## **Sample Responses**

- 1. **beside** Means "next to"; using *besides* would mean "apart from the map," changing spatial meaning to exclusion.
- 2. **Besides** Means "in addition to"; using *beside* would wrongly suggest physical placement next to the degree.
- 3. **beside** Means "next to"; using *besides* would imply "apart from each other," altering the sense of proximity.
- 4. **Besides** Means "other than"; using *beside* would make no sense because it refers to position, not addition.
- 5. **beside** Means "next to"; using *besides* would mean "apart from the sea," changing physical relation to comparison.
- 6. **Besides** Means "in addition to"; using *beside* would incorrectly suggest location near a moral issue.
- 7. **beside** Means "next to"; using *besides* would mean "apart from her painting," which changes the intended spatial meaning.
- 8. **Besides** Means "in addition to"; using *beside* would make the sentence illogical because it implies physical placement.

## • Differentiation Tips:

- Offer contextual hints or visuals for learners who struggle with abstract usage.
- Encourage higher-level students to locate real examples of both prepositions in academic texts and analyze tone shifts.

## • Engagement Idea:

 Pair students for a "Meaning Swap" challenge: one reads a sentence with **beside**, the other replaces it with **besides**, then they explain how the meaning changes aloud.

#### • Extension Activity:

Ask students to write a short analytical paragraph (6-8 sentences)
where both beside and besides appear naturally, and have peers
identify each use and its effect on tone or meaning.
