Read In Role Answer Key

Suggested Answers:

1. Student answers will vary (wizard, knight, or villager). Look for reasoning that connects to the character's traits (e.g., "I chose the knight because he sounds confident and strong").
2. Students might say that using character voices helped make the story dramatic, made emotions clearer, or helped them understand the characters' roles.
3. Students may find the wizard hardest (because of needing a deep or echoing voice) or the villager hardest (because of nervous tone). Any thoughtful explanation is correct.

Teacher Notes:

- This worksheet is designed to build **expressive reading fluency** by encouraging students to **adjust pitch, tone, and pace** to fit characters.
- Remind students that **fluency isn't just speed, it's about expression, too**.
- Allow students to practice multiple times with different characters. They may also try reading to a partner who guesses which character voice they're using.
- This activity strengthens **oral reading confidence, comprehension through dramatization, and engagement with text**.
