Step 1

- 1. Augustus, Violet, Veruca, and Mike each face consequences that match their flaws (greed, pride, selfishness, obsession).
- 2. Charlie stays humble, honest, and kind, so he is rewarded by inheriting the factory.
- 3. The story's moral is that kindness, humility, and honesty are more valuable than greed or selfishness.

Step 2 - Sample Paragraph

The moral of *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* is that kindness and humility are greater than greed, selfishness, or pride. Each of the other children shows a flaw: Augustus is greedy, Violet is competitive, Veruca is spoiled, and Mike is obsessed with television, and each suffers the consequences. Charlie, on the other hand, stays patient, polite, and kind despite his poverty. His good heart is what makes him the right choice to inherit the chocolate factory. Roald Dahl shows readers that true character, not wealth or arrogance, leads to real rewards in life.
