Have you ever wondered what would happen if one tiny moment in history went differently? What if the printing press was never invented? What if the internet existed in ancient Rome? What if electricity hadn't been discovered?
These kinds of "what if" questions are called alternate history or counterfactual thinking - imagining how the world might have changed if a key event turned out another way.
ChatGPT can help you explore these ideas by simulating how history might unfold under new conditions. But remember: ChatGPT doesn't <i>know</i> what would happen - it's imagining based on patterns and facts it has learned. Your job is to think critically about whether its ideas make sense and what they reveal about how history actually works.

1. Pick a Historical "What If" Question Choose an event or invention that changed the world. Then flip it! Examples:
"What if the American Revolution never happened?"
"What if phones were invented in the 1800s?"
"What if the moon landing failed?"
"What if the Black Death never occurred?"
