## **Gatsby's Goal Answer Key**

## **Reflection Question Guidance**

- 1. Gatsby pursues Daisy because he believes she represents his ideal happiness and the fulfillment of his dream.
- 2. His vision of Daisy is more **idealized** than real; he imagines her as perfect and unchanging, while reality shows her flaws and limitations.
- 3. Gatsby's motivation drives the central conflicts: the parties, the secret meetings, the confrontation in New York, and ultimately his death.
- 4. Students may argue either way:
  - o Love: He cannot stop loving her despite the odds.
  - Dream/status: Daisy symbolizes the American Dream, wealth, and perfection; his pursuit is as much about reclaiming his ideal self as about Daisy herself.

## **Teacher Notes:**

- Push students to see the difference between Daisy as a person and Daisy as a symbol of Gatsby's dream.
- Emphasize how motivation analysis deepens understanding of **character-driven plots**.
- Accept multiple interpretations if supported by textual evidence.
