## Teacher's Guide

- Review that money amounts are decimals with dollars and cents.
- Encourage students to compare the dollars first, then the cents when ordering prices.
- Provide a place value chart for students who need additional support comparing decimal values.
- Have students explain why one price is greater or less than another using place value language.
- Turn the activity into a partner challenge by asking students to create two new comparison questions using the price chart.
- Extend learning by asking students to choose any three items, order their prices, and find the total cost.
