### Teacher's Guide

- **Differentiation Tips:**
  - *For emerging readers:* Read each amendment aloud and use real-life examples (e.g., "You can choose your religion-First Amendment").
  - *For advanced learners:* Challenge students to add one modern example showing how each amendment still matters today.
- **Engagement Ideas:**
  - Play a "Freedom Flash" game-read a description, and students hold up the amendment number they think fits.
  - Create a classroom "Rights Wall" with each amendment written on a flag-shaped card.
- **Extension Activities:**
  - Have students write their own "Classroom Amendment" that protects fairness or respect in their learning space.
  - Integrate history by showing how amendments expanded rights over time (from the 1700s to the 1900s).
  - Pair with short primary-source excerpts, letting students identify which amendment protects the situation described.
