Audience Guess Game Answer Key

1. Write a short story about a puppy who learns to share toys with friends.

Answer: B. Kindergarten students

Why: Uses simple, friendly subject matter ("puppy," "sharing," "friends") - perfect for early readers.

2. Explain how the heart pumps blood through the body using correct scientific terms like "ventricle" and "artery."

Answer: A. Medical students

Why: Includes technical vocabulary and expects scientific accuracy - for a professional or advanced audience.

3. Create a travel guide that lists five interesting places to visit in Tokyo, including food spots and local customs.

Answer: C. Tourists

Why: Focuses on travel, experiences, and culture - fits readers who plan to visit or learn about the city.

4. Write a professional email to your principal explaining why your class should have more technology resources next year.

Answer: C. Principal

Why: Clearly identifies the recipient ("principal") and uses formal purpose-based phrasing.

5. Describe how a plant makes its own food in a way that a third grader could understand.

Answer: B. Third graders

Why: Mentions the target audience directly and specifies the level of simplicity needed.

6. Prepare a safety checklist for workers who handle dangerous chemicals in a lab.

Answer: B. Scientists

Why: Mentions "dangerous chemicals in a lab," which fits scientific or technical professionals.

7. Write a fun, rhyming poem that explains how to wash your hands properly.

Answer: A. Preschoolers

Why: "Fun" and "rhyming" signal a playful tone aimed at very young children.

8. Write a formal report describing the results of your science experiment, including your data and conclusion.

Answer: C. Classmates

Why: "Formal report" and "your science experiment" suggest a school assignment audience - likely peers or teacher.

9. Explain why recycling helps the planet and convince people in your community to start doing it more often.

Answer: B. The general public

Why: Uses persuasive language ("convince people in your community") directed broadly to everyday readers.

10. Write a thank-you note to your grandmother for the birthday gift she sent you.

Answer: C. Your grandmother

Why: Specifically mentions the grandmother as the recipient - clear audience identification.
