## 1. Better Prompt: B

**Underline**: "for 3rd graders," "about a shy dog," "who learns to make friends at the park." **Why it's better**: It names an audience, character, topic, and setting. Prompt A adds length but no direction-"lots of interesting parts" and "some excitement" are vague.

# 2. Better Prompt: A

**Underline**: "for a 5th-grade science project," "using clear steps and examples." **Why it's better**: It specifies audience, purpose, and structure. Prompt B ("in detail... completely") sounds elaborate but provides no useful focus or limit.

#### 3. Better Prompt: A

**Underline:** "the planets in our solar system," "short, factual paragraph," "for a 6th-grade science report."

Why it's better: It defines topic, format, and audience. Prompt B ("include lots of good information") is vague and unfocused.

### 4. Better Prompt: B

**Underline**: "short, funny rhyming poem," "for kids," "about how it feels when school starts again after summer break."

Why it's better: It provides tone, audience, and subject. Prompt B ("has rhyming and emotions") sounds descriptive but lacks a specific purpose or focus.

# 5. Better Prompt: A

**Underline**: "ten rainforest animals," "one surprising fact about each." **Why it's better**: It gives clear limits, topic, and task. Prompt B uses vague filler ("gives information... readers can learn more") without direction.

#### 6. Better Prompt: B

**Underline**: "in a paragraph," "uses sensory details," "explains why it's special to you." **Why it's better**: It tells format, technique, and purpose. Prompt B uses soft generalizations ("make it sound good") that don't help focus the writing.
