Audience Switch Challenge

When you ask an AI (or a person) to write something, the **audience** matters. A prompt written for a *kindergartner* will look and sound very different from one written for a *scientist* or *teacher*. If you don't say who the audience is, the AI has to guess - and it might give you the wrong kind of answer. By adding clear audience context, you help it choose the right **tone**, **word choice**, and **amount of detail**.



Example - Original Prompt: Explain how rainbows form.

Rewritten for Different Audiences:

- 1. For kindergartners:** Explain how rainbows form in simple, colorful language that compares them to magic in the sky.
- 2. For 5th graders:** Explain how rainbows form using light and color vocabulary that's easy for elementary students to understand.
- 3. For teachers:** Explain how rainbows form with classroom examples teachers can use in a science lesson.
- 4. For scientists:** Explain how rainbows form using scientific terms about light refraction, reflection, and wavelengths.

Notice how each version gives the same topic - but the *audience* changes the **tone**, **vocabulary**, and **depth** of explanation.
