The Industrial Shift

In the mid-1800s, factories in growing cities buzzed with the sound of new machines. Workers, many of them children, toiled for twelve or more hours a day with little pay. Safety measures were nearly nonexistent, and injuries were common. Despite harsh conditions, these jobs were considered valuable because they offered steady wages at a time when farming life was unpredictable. Business owners often argued that long hours built discipline and kept workers occupied. Newspapers of the time praised industrial progress, focusing on inventions and economic growth rather than the struggles of laborers. For many families, factory work symbolized opportunity, even if it came with hardship.
