Passage 1 ->

Her study included data from five different ocean regions and measured how rising sea temperatures affect coral reefs. The article contained graphs, detailed references, and a bibliography of sources.
Passage 2 →
An online post titled "Secrets of the Ocean They Don't Want You to Know!" was
published on a website called <i>OceanMystics.com</i> . The author, who uses the nickname "WaveWatcher," claimed that coral reefs are not actually dying but transforming into a "new hidden form of life." No data, expert sources, or scientific references were included.
Passage 3 →
The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) released a 2023 report on ocean health. The report included satellite data, long-term studies, and recommendations for protecting marine ecosystems. The report was available for free on the agency's official government website.
