- 5. Raskolnikov wrestles with the idea of confessing his crime.
- 6. Luzhin accuses Sonia of theft to disgrace her.
- 7. Raskolnikov feels both repelled by and drawn to Svidrigailov.
- 8. Dunya resists Svidrigailov's obsessive pursuit of her.
