

## Viewpoint Transform Answer Key

Student responses will vary. A correct response should include:

- The same place described from both perspectives.
- The **optimistic traveler** description using positive tone words such as **bright, welcoming, open, cheerful, glowing, promising**.
- The **worried explorer** description using cautious tone words such as **shadowed, uneasy, sharp, distant, uncertain, hidden**.
- A clear explanation showing understanding of tone change.
- Two identified words or phrases that reveal the shift.

Example contrasting phrases:

- Traveler: **warm sunlight across the path**
- Explorer: **dark corners that hide movement**

### Teacher's Guide

- **Differentiation Tips:**
  - Provide tone word lists labeled positive and cautious for students who need support.
  - Offer sentence frames such as **I notice...**, **I hesitate because...**, or **The place seems...**
  - Allow verbal rehearsal before writing for students who need processing time.
- **Engagement Ideas:**
  - Have students read both descriptions aloud and let classmates guess the point of view.
  - Invite students to illustrate the same place twice based on each tone.
  - Encourage pairs to compare their tone words and discuss how small changes shift perspective.
- **Extension Ideas:**
  - Ask students to add a third point of view such as an impatient visitor or a creature that lives there.
  - Challenge advanced writers to turn one description into a narrative opening paragraph.
  - Create a class chart of strong tone-shifting words and phrases.
