

Triple Imagery Builder Answer Key

A correct response should demonstrate:

- A clearly dominant imagery type: **sound**, **color**, or **motion**.
- Consistent, intentional descriptive choices that support that imagery.
- A paragraph with logical structure, clear flow, and precise sensory detail.

Sample Acceptable Paragraph (Color Imagery): Shades of deep gold swept across the hillside as the sun dipped lower, brightening the edges of each rolling wave of grass. Pale lavender flowers dotted the field, their petals glowing softly in the fading light. A band of glowing orange clouds stretched overhead, painting the sky in warm hues. Even the quiet shadows along the rocks carried hints of blue that shifted and deepened as the evening settled in. (Any paragraph using one dominant imagery type effectively is acceptable.)

Teacher's Guide

- **Skill Focus:** Students learn to craft paragraphs with intentional imagery to strengthen descriptive structure and voice.
- **Differentiation:**
 - Provide a curated list of imagery-specific vocabulary for students needing support.
 - Allow students to annotate a sample paragraph first, identifying imagery types before writing their own.
- **Engagement Tips:**
 - Have students listen to short clips of sounds or view color palettes and motion sequences to spark ideas.
 - Invite students to share which imagery type they chose and why before writing.
- **Extension Ideas:**
 - Ask students to revise their paragraph by blending two imagery types while keeping one dominant.
 - Assign a second paragraph with the opposite imagery type to compare stylistic differences.
