Focus Skill: Using dialogue to **show mood** through tone, pacing, and word choice without directly stating emotions.

Teaching Tips

- Encourage students to use short or clipped lines for a tense mood, energetic language for joy, and quiet or cautious speech for mystery.
- Remind them that dialogue can work with small actions or sounds to build atmosphere.
- Highlight the importance of **implied emotion** instead of naming feelings.

Engagement Ideas

- Let students read each other's dialogues and guess the intended mood.
- Have groups perform short scenes based on their written dialogue.
- Create a "Mood Mixer" activity where students combine different moods with unexpected settings.
