Teaching Tips

- Explain how voice reflects personality. A bold character uses strong statements, while a shy character uses softer language.
- Model rewriting a single line in several voices to show how small choices shift tone.
- Highlight word choice, pacing, and sentence length as key tools for voice.

Differentiation

- Provide word banks for each voice type such as bold words (sure, definitely), shy words (maybe, kind of), formal words (therefore, however).
- Offer sentence starters for students who struggle getting started.
