Sample Reflection Answer

Cervantes uses the contrast between Don Quixote and Sancho Panza to explore how people balance dreams with reality. Don Quixote represents idealism: he sees the world as he wants it to be. Sancho, however, represents realism: he sees the world as it truly is. Together, they create humor but also raise questions about whether people should chase impossible dreams or stick to practical truth. Cervantes seems to admire Don Quixote's spirit, even while showing the dangers of his delusions.
