- 1. don't / no → Correct: I don't need any help with my science project.
- 2. **hasn't / never**  $\rightarrow$  Correct: She has never seen a shooting star before.
- 3. **didn't / nothing**  $\rightarrow$  Correct: They didn't do anything during the class activity.
- 4. **doesn't / nobody** → Correct: He doesn't want anybody to miss the bus.
- couldn't / hardly → Correct: We could hardly hear the speaker at the assembly.
- 6. **hasn't / no**  $\rightarrow$  Correct: The team hasn't won any games this season.
- 7.  $don't / no \rightarrow Correct$ : I don't want any more pizza after dinner.
- 8. **didn't / nobody** → Correct: The kids didn't see anybody on the playground.
- 9. **doesn't / no**  $\rightarrow$  Correct: She doesn't have any pencils left in her desk.
- 10. haven't / never → Correct: I have never read that book before.

## **Teacher Notes / Guide**

- Key Point: Double negatives don't make a sentence stronger—they usually make it confusing.
- Correction Strategy: Replace the second negative with a positive form (no

  → any, nothing → anything, nobody → anybody, never → ever), or remove
  one negative.
- Extension Idea: After students rewrite the sentences, have them explain why the correction makes the sentence clearer. This builds metacognitive grammar awareness.
