- 1. $don't / no \rightarrow Correct$: I don't have any pencils in my desk.
- never / nothing → Correct: She never saw anything strange in the old house.
- 3. **can't / hardly** \rightarrow Correct: We can hardly wait for the show to start.
- 4. **doesn't / nothing** → Correct: He doesn't know anything about the project.
- 5. **didn't / nobody** → Correct: They didn't see anybody in the park that night.
- 6. **don't / no** → Correct: I don't want any more candy before dinner.
- 7. **couldn't / nothing** → Correct: We couldn't find anything to watch on television.
- 8. **doesn't / no** → Correct: She doesn't need any help finishing her work.
- 9. **didn't / nothing** → Correct: He didn't say anything about the surprise party.
- 10.can't / nowhere → Correct: I can't find my keys anywhere.

Teacher Notes / Guide:

- **Double negatives** happen when two negative words are used in the same sentence, which makes the meaning unclear or incorrect.
- Common negative words include: no, not, never, nobody, nothing, nowhere, don't, can't, doesn't, couldn't.
- The fix usually involves changing one of the negatives into a positive word (no \rightarrow any, nothing \rightarrow anything, nobody \rightarrow anybody).
- Reinforce that standard English requires just one negative word per idea.
