Evaluating Multiple Pieces of Information

Instructions: Read the passages carefully. Analyze the actions, words, and situations. Then draw a judgment-based conclusion supported by details from the text.

Passage 1 - Liam was the new kid at school. During his first week, he made an effort to introduce himself to everyone in his classes. He asked questions during group work, laughed at people's jokes, and offered to help carry equipment in gym class. Still, no one invited him to eat lunch with them. He often sat alone, pretending to scroll through his phone.
