Sample Answers

- 1. The Great Depression was a severe worldwide economic downturn that began in 1929 and lasted through the 1930s.
- 2. Many Mexican families migrated to the U.S. for farm work after losing land, jobs, or businesses in Mexico.
- 3. Migrant workers often picked crops such as grapes, cotton, and vegetables.
- 4. Camps were usually overcrowded, unsanitary, and lacked electricity or running water.
- 5. Families faced hunger, poverty, and uncertainty; children often had to work to help support their families.

Sample Connections

- Families lost jobs and homes during the Great Depression → Esperanza loses her home to the fire and must leave Mexico for survival.
- Migrant workers lived in crowded labor camps with poor conditions →
 Esperanza and Mama live in the camp where Esperanza learns to do
 chores and share space with others.
- Strikes and protests were organized for better wages and working conditions → Esperanza witnesses strikes at the farm, which threaten her job and safety.
