Changing Words, Changing Times Answer Key

- 1. A euphemism is a polite or gentle way of saying something unpleasant or sensitive. People use them to show respect or avoid offending others.
- 2. "Insane asylum" \rightarrow "mental institution" \rightarrow "mental health facility."
- 3. Because society wanted to use language that showed respect and focused on the person, not the condition.
- 4. Because people's beliefs and feelings about death shift over time, and language evolves to match changing attitudes.
- 5. Answers will vary (e.g., "passed away" instead of "died").

Teaching Tips:

- Begin by asking students to brainsform words from history that have changed due to social awareness.
