Since this is a debate activity, answers will vary. Strong student responses should include:

If Arguing Censorship Protects Society

- **Novel Evidence**: Beatty claims censorship prevents conflict by avoiding offensive books; Mildred and her friends avoid difficult emotions by focusing only on entertainment.
- Claim: Censorship protects people from disturbing ideas and maintains social "harmony."
- Counterargument/Response: While it may reduce conflict, it also prevents growth and critical thinking.

If Arguing Censorship Harms Society

- **Novel Evidence:** Clarisse's questions reveal how little people think; the old woman dies for her books, showing they hold deep meaning; Montag transforms only after confronting forbidden knowledge.
- Claim: Censorship harms society because it destroys individuality and suppresses truth.
- Counterargument/Response: Opponents may say censorship prevents chaos, but the novel shows society collapsing under shallow emptiness.

Broader Connections (Sample Ideas)

- Historical examples of banned books, art, or music.
- Modern debates about controlling media or online speech.
- Importance of free press and open access to knowledge.
