1. **What makes this moment meaningful for Nina?**

Text Evidence: "When she lifted the bracelet from the river, she saw initials carved inside—her grandmother's."

Revised Understanding: The moment is meaningful because the bracelet belonged to her grandmother, symbolizing a powerful personal connection and sense of memory.

2. **How does the author show Nina's feelings about the river?**

Text Evidence: "She had walked this trail dozens of times, but today the water seemed louder, stronger."

Revised Understanding: The changing tone of the river reflects Nina's emotions—it mirrors her awareness and nostalgia, showing the river as almost alive with memory.

3. **What lesson or message might the story suggest?**

Text Evidence: "The bracelet had been lost for years, yet here it was, returned by the same river her grandmother used to visit every spring."

Revised Understanding: The story suggests that nature, family, and memory are deeply connected—some things return to us through time and patience.

Reflection Example:

Using direct evidence helped me realize that the story is not just about finding an object; it's about emotional connection and remembrance. My first answers were simple guesses, but the quotes helped reveal deeper meaning and symbolism in the river.

Teaching Tip: Begin with a warm-up discussion: Ask, "How reliable are answers based only on memory?"

Assessment Tip - Evaluate responses on three dimensions:

1. **Accuracy** - Does the quote or detail truly support the idea?
2. **Depth** - Does the revision demonstrate new insight or refined understanding?
3. **Reflection Quality** - Does the student clearly explain how evidence improved comprehension?
