## Landscapes of Finn Answer Key

### Purpose of the Activity:

This activity helps students see how the riverbanks and shoreline, the cabin, and the town/settlements act as more than physical places. By visualizing these spaces, students learn how settings create mood, shape character choices, and reflect themes like freedom, confinement, and decay.

### Teacher's Guide:

- Provide the worksheets with three labeled boxes: Riverbanks and Shoreline, Cabin, Town/Settlements.
- Gather art supplies (colored pencils, markers, scissors, glue) or allow digital collages.
- Review a few key passages that describe these settings so students can draw inspiration directly from the text.

### Implementation Steps:

Briefly discuss each setting with the class:

- Riverbanks and Shoreline → often symbolize movement, danger, and possibility.
- Cabin → represents confinement, decay, and family struggles.
- Town/Settlements → highlight rules, social order, and corruption.

### Assessment / Follow-Up:

- Use a gallery walk or small-group sharing so students compare how the same setting can carry different symbolic meanings.
- As an extension, ask students to decide: Which of the three settings best captures the theme of confinement versus freedom? Why?
