## The Great Escape: Freeing Questions from Tiny Boxes

Sometimes questions are so specific they trap the answer in a tiny box. For example: "In exactly three words, explain why George Washington wore a wig."

That's way too narrow! A broader version gives more breathing room, like: "Why did people in the 1700s wear wigs, and what role did George Washington's hair play in his image?"



In this activity, you'll take questions that are *too narrow* and open them up so they can invite fuller, more useful answers. Think of it like zooming out with a camera-you still see the important details, but now the bigger picture makes sense too.

**Too Narrow Question:** In two sentences, explain why Abraham Lincoln grew a beard.

**Opened-Up Question:** Why did Abraham Lincoln grow a beard, and how did it affect his public image during his presidency?
