

Will Have Been Asking Answer Key

1. Yes/No: Will she have been teaching at the university for five years by next June?
Wh-Question: How long will she have been teaching at the university by next June?
2. Yes/No: Will they have been waiting at the airport for three hours by the time we arrive?
Wh-Question: Where will they have been waiting by the time we arrive?
3. Yes/No: Will he have been studying medicine for seven years by the time he graduates?
Wh-Question: What will he have been studying for seven years by the time he graduates?
4. Yes/No: Will we have been practicing for the concert every evening by the end of the week?
Wh-Question: When will we have been practicing for the concert every evening?
5. Yes/No: Will the workers have been repairing the bridge for two months by then?
Wh-Question: What will the workers have been repairing for two months by then?

Teacher Notes / Guide

- **Why this activity works:** Students practice **both question types** with the same sentence, reinforcing the **word order and inversion rules** while keeping focus on the future perfect continuous form.
- **Key Strategy:** Encourage students to **underline the time marker** (e.g., *by next June, by then*) to ensure their questions remain anchored in the future reference point.
- **Common Error Alert:** Students may drop "been" ("*Will she have teaching...*") or misplace the Wh-word. Remind them to always keep **"will have been" together**.
- **Extension Idea:** Pair students up and have them turn the Wh-Questions into a **mini-interview** (e.g., "How long will you have been studying English by the end of this year?"). This builds both grammar accuracy and speaking fluency.
