Sample Transformations

- 1. She will have been working at the library for three years.
- 2. I will have been studying English for ten months.
- 3. They will have been living in this city since 2010.
- 4. He will have been practicing the guitar for two hours.
- 5. We will have been waiting here for thirty minutes.
- 6. By next week, she will have been training.
- 7. By tomorrow, I will have been reading this book.
- 8. By the end of the month, they will have been painting the house.
- 9. By midnight, he will have been writing his essay.
- 10. By next summer, we **will have been traveling** to five countries.

Teacher Notes / Guide

- Why this activity works: Students often confuse future perfect ("will have done") with future perfect continuous ("will have been doing"). This challenge helps them spot the difference in meaning—future perfect emphasizes completion, while future perfect continuous emphasizes duration.
- **Key Strategy for Students:** Look for **time markers** (e.g., by tomorrow, for two years, since 2010). These signal that the action is still in progress up to that future point.
- Classroom Extension Idea: After students transform the sentences, have them explain the difference in meaning between the original and transformed versions. For example:
 - "By next week, she will have finished her training." (focus on completion)
 - "By next week, she will have been training." (focus on the ongoing process).
