## Evidence Vault

1. The committee praised the proposal's ambition, but warned that its timeline was **untenable** given the staffing limits and the legal review required before implementation. Several members suggested phasing the rollout in smaller pilots rather than launching district-wide at once.
2. In the novel, the narrator's account feels precise until the final chapter, where contradictions accumulate and small details quietly shift. The result is an **equivocal** confession that leaves the reader uncertain whether the speaker is protecting someone else or protecting their own image.
3. The lab report noted that the initial results were promising; however, the sample size was narrow and the control conditions were inconsistent across trials. Without replication, the findings remain **provisional**, intended to guide the next round of testing rather than to settle the question.
4. During the debate, the candidate projected confidence, but their answers relied on vague slogans and avoided the policy specifics the moderator requested. Several viewers described the performance as **glib**, polished on the surface yet thin in substance.
5. The essay begins by condemning censorship, then immediately argues that certain books should be removed to preserve public morality. This tension is not a mistake. It is the writer's deliberate use of **irony** to expose how easily people endorse restrictions when they feel personally threatened.
6. Although the organization claimed to be transparent, the budget documents were released with key sections blacked out, and meeting notes referenced "off-record agreements" without explanation. Critics called the process **opaque**, arguing that the public could not verify how decisions were made.
