Education has always been the backbone of opportunity in America. Yet today, too many students are denied access to higher education simply because of cost. A recent study found that the average college graduate leaves school with nearly \$30,000 in debt. For low-income families, that number makes college appear impossible.

Free public college tuition would open the doors of opportunity for millions. In countries like Germany and Finland, students already benefit from free or extremely low-cost higher education, and their economies remain competitive in a global market. If these nations can make it work, so can we.

Critics argue that free tuition would be too expensive. But in reality, the U.S. already spends billions on tax breaks that primarily benefit the wealthy.
