When I first arrived in the United States at age eleven, I felt like I was living between two invisible walls. At home, I spoke Spanish, the language of warmth, humor, and comfort. At school, I was expected to think and speak only in English, a language that felt sharp, full of rules I kept breaking without realizing it.

Over time, I learned to translate myself, adjusting tone and vocabulary depending on who I was with. But in translation, something was always lost: the jokes that didn't land in English, the sayings my grandmother used that made no sense to my classmates. I began to wonder: was I becoming two different people, or just one person trying to be whole?

Now, as an adult, I understand that my identity is not split but layered. My cultural background doesn't weigh me down; it gives me depth. What once felt like walls now feels like bridges, connecting me to more than one world.
