1. How can you **analyze** the author's main argument to determine whether it is convincing?
2. How does the character's **perspective** influence the decisions made in the story?
3. What is one possible **consequence** of ignoring the warning described in the article?
4. What **evidence** does the text provide to support the claim about climate change?
5. How might a reader **interpret** the final paragraph differently than the opening one?
6. Why is this event **significant** to the overall message of the text?
7. How can the author **justify** the solution proposed for the problem?
8. How does the author **contrast** the two viewpoints presented in the passage?

Teacher's Guide

- **Using this worksheet**
 - Review what makes a strong question: clear focus, correct word usage, and thoughtful thinking.
 - Model one example by turning a basic question into a deeper discussion question.
- **Differentiation**
 - Support: Provide question starters such as "How does..." or "Why is..." for students to complete.
 - Challenge: Require students to write one discussion question and one comprehension question per word.
