Accurate And Natural Answer Key

Note: Student answers may vary. Examples below show accurate, precise revisions.

1. Replace **ecstatic** with a word showing focused seriousness. Example: The detective was **intent** as she studied the footprints at the crime scene, carefully noting shoe size and direction.
2. Replace **transparent** with a word meaning unclear. Example: The instructions were **confusing**, so I had to ask three people what to do next.
3. Replace **random** with a word meaning specific. Example: The teacher's feedback was **detailed**, pointing out exact places where my evidence did not match my claim.
4. Replace **whispered** with a word meaning spoke loudly or announced. Example: When the debate ended, the principal **announced** the winners over the loudspeaker to the whole gym.
5. Replace **meticulous** with a word matching chaotic behavior. Example: The puppy was **hyperactive**, sprinting in circles and knocking over the water bowl.
6. Replace **ancient** with a word meaning modern or recent. Example: The museum exhibit was **new**, because it opened last month and includes new technology for visitors.

Teacher's Guide

- Using this worksheet
 - Remind students that precision is about meaning, not just using longer words.
 - Ask students to circle the context clues that prove the original word does not fit, then revise.
- Differentiation
 - Support: Let students revise by choosing from two options per item, then explain why the chosen word fits better.
 - Challenge: Require students to add one more detail to the sentence that reinforces the revised word without changing the meaning.
