

## Stand Up To Bullying Answer Key

### Sample Responses

1. Aiden can speak up by saying, "That's not funny," or move closer to the teased student and include them in conversation.
2. Sophie can invite Emma to work with her and tell the group everyone deserves to be included.
3. Carlos can say, "That's not okay," or tell a teacher about what he heard.
4. Taylor can get a teacher, coach, or adult immediately and comfort the student afterward.
5. Jordan can report the comments to an adult and send a kind message privately to the classmate.
6. Alex can calmly suggest a break or get a teacher to help before things get worse.

### Teacher's Guide

- **Differentiation Tips:**
  - Read each role card aloud and ask guided questions like "What clues tell us this is bullying?"
  - For students who need extra support, provide sentence starters such as "I could help by..." or "A kind choice would be..."
  - For advanced learners, have them explain the possible *impact* of their actions on others.
- **Engagement Ideas:**
  - Use the role cards for a classroom role-play where each student acts out one scenario and models a positive response.
  - Create "Bystander Superhero" badges for students who come up with strong, kind actions.
- **Extension Activities:**
  - Ask students to write one new role card from their own life experience or something they imagine could happen at school.
  - Develop a class poster titled "We Stand Up Together" listing safe and kind ways to help in teasing or bullying situations.
