Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address (1863, adapted excerpt)

In November 1863, President Abraham Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address at the dedication of a cemetery for soldiers who died in a decisive Civil War battle. His speech was remarkably brief, lasting only a few minutes, yet it became one of the most famous in American history. Lincoln reminded the audience that the nation had been founded on the principle of liberty and equality. He honored the soldiers who had given their lives so that the nation might survive. In doing so, he challenged the living to continue their work. The line "government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth" captured the central meaning of the war and America's democratic ideals. Though short, the address has been remembered for its powerful words and lasting influence.
