Excerpt 1: The poet wrote, "Eye sea the truth clearly now."

- 1. What two homophones are used for effect?
- 2. How does replacing the usual words with these homophones change the tone or suggest a deeper meaning?
- 3. What could this line reveal about the poet's view of perception or insight?

Excerpt 2: In a satirical essay, a politician declares, "We must make sure our *principles* never change, even if our *principals* do."

- 1. What is ironic about this statement?
- 2. Explain how the play on homophones contributes to the humor or criticism in the line.

Excerpt 3: In a fantasy novel, a knight says to his squire, "You must *kneel* to know what it means to *feel* honor."

- 1. How do the similar sounds of *kneel* and *feel* emphasize the theme of humility and emotion?
- 2. What literary effect does the author achieve through this pairing of sound and meaning?

Excerpt 4: A playwright includes the line, "The heir felt the weight of his new *air* of power."

- 1. How does the homophone use of *heir* and *air* create a double meaning?
- 2. What commentary might the author be making about privilege or leadership through this wordplay?
