

Truth Or Chat? Answer Key

1. If ChatGPT gives you an idea but you write the wording yourself, you do not need to cite it. **False**

Justify - Even if you change the wording, the idea still came from the AI and must be acknowledged as a source of intellectual contribution. Citation is about giving credit for ideas, not just for wording.

2. You should always cite ChatGPT even if you only used it to check spelling and grammar. **False**

Justify - Editing, grammar correction, or formatting assistance does not constitute a source of ideas or text, so citation is not needed. Acknowledgment is only necessary when the AI meaningfully contributes to the content of your work.

3. AI tools like ChatGPT are considered "personal communications" in APA style because their responses cannot be retrieved by others. **True**

Justify - Since ChatGPT conversations are unique and cannot be accessed later by another person, they fit the APA definition of personal communication. These are cited in-text but not included in the reference list unless your instructor requests it.

4. If you ask ChatGPT for a summary of an article, you only need to cite the original article, not the AI. **False**

Justify - Both should be cited because the AI created a specific summary that you used, and the original article provided the information being summarized. Failing to cite the AI ignores its role in shaping the text you used.

5. If ChatGPT generates a paragraph that you copy into your essay, you should cite ChatGPT as the author. **True**

Justify - Any text that comes directly from ChatGPT should be attributed to it as the creator of that language. In APA or MLA style, ChatGPT is listed as the authoring tool or source for the passage.

6. You can list "ChatGPT" as a co-author on your paper if it wrote part of the text. **False**

Justify - AI tools cannot assume authorship because they are not capable of responsibility, consent, or intellectual accountability. You may cite ChatGPT as a source, but you remain the sole author of your work.

7. In MLA format, you should include the prompt you gave the AI in the Works Cited entry. **True**

Justify - MLA style recommends including a description of the prompt so that readers understand the context of the AI's output. This ensures transparency about how the material was generated.
