Tenement Living Then and Now

In the late 1800s and early 1900s, many immigrants arriving through Ellis Island moved into crowded city neighborhoods. They lived in tenements, which were tall buildings divided into small apartments. Families often shared one or two rooms with no running water, limited light, and poor ventilation. Streets were noisy, and garbage sometimes piled up because there were so many people living close together.

Today, city life for immigrants is still busy, but housing and living conditions have improved in many ways. Apartments usually include heat, electricity, and clean running water. Safety rules and building codes help protect families from danger. Even though space can still be tight and rent expensive, many families have better access to schools, transportation, and jobs than immigrants in the past did.
