Join with Conjunctions

(Many combinations are possible; here are logical examples.)

1. **Although** she studied all night, she was still worried about the test. (A1 → B2)
2. **Because** the dog barked loudly, the neighbors couldn't sleep. (A2 → B5)
3. **When** the storm ended, the roads were safe to drive on. (A3 → B8)
4. **Since** he practiced every day, he became a better player. (A4 → B6)
5. **Because** we arrived late, we found our seats quickly. (A5 → B1)
6. **When** the lights went out, the power came back on. (A6 → B3)
7. **Since** they had extra tickets, they invited us to join them. (A7 → B7)
8. **Before** the movie began, the audience quieted down. (A8 → B4)

Teacher Notes / Guide

- Stress that **dependent clauses need a subordinating conjunction** to connect them to independent clauses.
- Encourage students to **try multiple conjunctions** with the same pair to see how meaning changes.
 - *Although she studied all night vs. Because she studied all night* → different logical relationships.
- Allow flexibility: different pairings can be correct as long as the sentence is grammatically sound and logical.
- Extension: Have students **swap their Bonus Challenge sentences** with a partner for peer review.
