Regional Case Study: The Maldives and the Indian Ocean

The Maldives is a nation made up of hundreds of small coral islands located in the central Indian Ocean. Its islands sit only a few feet above sea level, which makes the country closely connected to the ocean both for survival and for future challenges. The Maldives depends on the Indian Ocean for fishing, which supplies food and jobs for many families. Tourism is another major part of its economy, as visitors come for clear waters, coral reefs, and unique island landscapes.

Although the ocean supports life in the Maldives, it also presents risks. Rising sea levels threaten to flood low islands, and warming ocean temperatures can damage coral reefs. These reefs protect coastlines from strong waves and also support the marine life that draws visitors. Because of these challenges, the Maldives is working with scientists and other countries to protect its reefs, improve sustainability, and prepare for long-term environmental changes.
